

Alone Through the Terrain on a Trajectory of Motion

The debut project in the DSC Depository cycle, titled "Through the Landscape Alone, on a Trajectory of Movement," presents the work of four artists from the post-digital generation. The exhibition explores scenes in which the observer finds themselves directly influenced by pristine, undisturbed nature. Through their work, the artists capture moments of introspective turning inward. This exhibition is not only a visual representation of the landscape, but most importantly, an exploration of its function as a medium of self-discovery. The artists reflect on the disorientation caused by the digital age, the overload of information, and the need to retreat from constant connectivity.





The artworks express the search for new perspectives and paths to self-understanding. The landscape and its elements serve both as central actors and catalysts of this process. They invite complete physical and mental release, triggering automatic movement. This creates an inner and outer flow that allows the viewer to access deeper layers of the subconscious and undergo a trans-formative experience—one shaped by individual sensitivity and openness to the natural environment. The liberated trajectory of motion, rising from the subconscious, flows outward and returns again into the landscape. The exhibition title is a metaphor for this energy exchange: a meditation through movement, complete surrender.

At first glance, the exhibition appears to offer a new take on contemporary landscape paintings—an ode to specific sceneries and natural features—but beneath the surface, it reveals a layered reflection on issues burdening today's generation: dependency on digital devices, invasive communication channels, mental strain from social media, and the loss of ability to filter the flow of information. The selection of new works by Treterová, Soumar, Krykun, and Špačková reveals a testimonial on these societal aspects. The fragility of the psyche and the resulting need for social isolation are central themes. The artworks capture solace, comfort, and peace in solitude, and a merging with new currents of nature.

Olga Krykun (1994, Odesa, Ukraine) is a visual artist based in Prague, a nominee for the prestigious StartPoint Prize and a laureate of the Jindřich Chalupecký Award. A graduate of UMPRUM (studios of Jiří Černický and Michal Novotný), she earned her bachelor's degree in the Studio of Supermedia and her master's in Painting. Krykun works with various media, primarily painting, but also objects and video art, combining them into complex installations. Her work blends fictional narratives with references to culturally and socially relevant symbols, creating a contemporary mythology. Previously, Krykun responded to digital media phenomena like TikTok. In recent series, she depicts flowers as carriers of reflection on the war in Ukraine, as well as on humanity and life's fragility.

Julie Stavianis Špačková (1999, Prague) is a painter formerly studying at the Academy of Fine Arts in Prague. Her oil paintings are marked by vibrant energy and expressive brushwork that mirrors her overwhelmed mental state in the digital age. Her compositions deconstruct scenes—real or imagined—and reassemble them into new complex realities with their own rules. Špačková draws inspiration from her surroundings, social interactions, and recently also music. Her sensitivity to the environment is reflected in her visual language, which oscillates between intentional structure and automatic expression.








Anna Treterová (2000, Jihlava) is graduating this year from the Faculty of Fine Arts at the University of Ostrava. She focuses on classical media such as painting and sculpture, while also experimenting with new media and video. Her work reflects philosophical and ecological themes, poetically depicting the complex interconnections in nature and their relation to human society. She often uses motifs of natural structures, assembling them into imaginative compositions based on her own experiences of the Czech landscape. Her approach is also informed by scientific methods such as microscopy and concepts from theoretical physics, like string theory.

Jan Soumar (1995, Prague) is a painter whose work explores dynamism and motion, often working in series. His earlier works examined the acceleration of contemporary life, visual and virtual noise, and digital distortions from mobile apps. He now balances abstraction and figuration, focusing on the human figure in the landscape. His paintings reflect the media transformation of imagery in the digital age. He separates layers of reality, often isolating the individual. Soumar studied at the Academy of Fine Arts in Prague (studios of Michael Rittstein and Josef Bolf). His dynamic canvases capture the tension between digital and physical landscapes, portraying the pulse of our time.
